M-TEL MASTERS



Super-tournament with six players in a double round robin, organised between 2005 and 2009 in Sofia, Bulgaria, sponsored by the national telecom company M-TEL.

A particularity of the rules was that the players should not offer draws directly to their opponents. Draw-offers will be allowed only through the Chief-Arbiter in three cases: in a triple-repetition of the position, in a perpetual check and in theoretically drawn positions.

The winners were: 2005 Veselin Topalov, 2006 Veselin Topalov, 2007 Veselin Topalov, 2008 Vassily Ivanchuk, and 2009 Alexey Shirov.

M-Tel Masters, Sofia

Mtel Masters was an annual <u>super-GM chess</u> tournament held between 2005 and 2009 in <u>Sofia</u>, <u>Bulgaria</u>, sponsored and organized by the Bulgarian mobile network operator, <u>M-Tel</u>. The event was always held as a double round-robin of six players at the <u>Grand Hotel Sofia</u>.

The edition of 2007 was especially close, all six participants finished within one point!

Record winner is Topalov (three wins in a row, he played in all five editions at M-Tel in Sofia).

Winners: Veselin Topalov (3x), Vassily Ivanchuk (1x), Alexei Shirov (1x), all winning outright.

Further participants amongst others: <u>Viswanathan Anand</u>, <u>Vladimir Kramnik</u>, <u>Magnus Carlsen</u> (all three past, present or future World Chess Champion, never winning at Sofia M-Tel tournament!), as well as <u>Peter Svidler</u>, <u>Gata Kamsky</u>, <u>Michael Adams</u>, <u>Étienne Bacrot</u>, <u>Levon Aronian</u>, <u>Shakhriyar Mamedyarov</u>, <u>Teimour Radjabov</u>, <u>Ruslan Ponomariov</u>, <u>Bu Xiangzhi</u>, <u>Wang Yue</u>, or <u>Judit Polgár</u>.

Kasparov (retired in spring 2005), Karpov, and Korchnoi never did take part. Neither Kiril Georgiev.

The five Sofia M-Tel Masters from 2005 – 2009

2005

The first edition of the tournament took place between 11 and 22 May 2005 as part of M-Tel's tenth anniversary celebrations and with the participation of top chess players such as <u>Viswanathan Anand, Veselin Topalov, Vladimir Kramnik, Michael Adams, Judit Polgár</u> and <u>Ruslan Ponomariov</u>. M-Tel Masters 2005 was classified in <u>FIDE's</u> Category 20 and was named the strongest tournament of 2005 according to the average <u>Elo rating</u> of the participants of 2744. The winner of the tournament was the Bulgarian Veselin Topalov, with the award being conferred by Bulgarian President Georgi Parvanov.

2006

The 2006 tournament took place between 10 May and 21 May and was attended by reigning FIDE World Chess Champion Veselin Topalov, Viswanathan Anand, Ruslan Ponomariov, <u>Peter Svidler</u>, <u>Étienne Bacrot</u> and <u>Gata Kamsky</u>. <u>Brazilian writer Paulo Coelho</u> played the token initial move of the 2006 tournament, which was officially opened by the <u>President of Bulgaria</u>, Georgi Parvanov.

Topalov won the tournament for the second time after a decisive comeback from a somewhat hesitant start. He recorded four consecutive wins in the final rounds to clinch the M-Tel Masters 2006 first place with 6½ points, also defeating his main rival Kamsky in the penultimate round.

2007

M-Tel Masters' 2007 edition was held between 9 May and 20 May and featured Veselin Topalov, <u>Liviu-Dieter Nisipeanu</u>, <u>Shakhriyar Mamedyarov</u>, Gata Kamsky, <u>Michael Adams</u> and <u>Krishnan Sasikiran</u>. Topalov won the tournament for a third consecutive time in a dramatic fashion, defeating the then-current leader Sasikiran in the final round. Only the winner is beyond the notorious 50%!

2008

The 2008 M-Tel Masters was held 8–18 May. <u>Vassily Ivanchuk</u> won by a wide margin. Ivanchuk won his first five games, lost no games, and had a positive score against every other player. <u>Veselin Topalov</u>, who had won the tournament the three previous years, finished second.

2009

The 2009 edition of the tournament took place from 12 to 23 May. Besides regular feature Veselin Topalov, the invited grandmasters were young <u>Magnus Carlsen</u>, <u>Vassily Ivanchuk</u>, <u>Alexei Shirov</u>, <u>Wang Yue</u> and <u>Leinier Domínguez</u>. Big win for Alexei Shirov who took the last event outright and unbeaten ahead of joint runners-up Carlsen and Topalov.
